- 1 connected with the Middle Ages (=the period between about 1100 and 1500 AD)
 - These spices were first brought to Italy from the East in medieval times.

- 1 OUTSIDE PART [countable] the part of an object that is furthest from its centre
 - Put the eggs in the centre of the dish, with the vegetables and herbs around the edge.

- a) used to say that something is interesting, useful, or helpful
 - A lot of the small towns in the area are definitely worth visiting.
 - The film is well worth seeing.

The local museum is worth a visit.

1 traditional music that has been played by ordinary people in a particular area for a long time

the time of day when the <u>roads</u>, <u>buses</u>, <u>trains</u> etc are most <u>full</u>, because people are <u>travelling</u> to or from work

- I got caught in the morning rush hour.

- 1 time when you are not working or studying and can relax and do things you enjoy
 - Most people now enjoy shorter working hours and more leisure time.
 - Watching television is now the nation's most popular leisure activity.
 - The hotel offers various leisure facilities such as a swimming pool and sauna.

used to say that something is likely to happen, likely to be true etc

- 1) It will probably take about a week.
- This would probably be a good time to take a break.
- 1) It's probably the best movie I have ever seen.

- 1 to pay someone to work for you
 - The factory employs over 2,000 people.

employ somebody as something

(*) Kelly is employed as a mechanic.

employ somebody to do something

(waste.) We have been employed to look at ways of reducing waste.

1 the <u>importance</u> of an event, action etc, especially because of the effects or <u>influence</u> it will have in the future OPP **insignificance**

Stella didn't attach any significance to Doug's query.

significance of

- (a) the significance of climate change
- The book assesses the significance of Stalin's policies between 1927 and 1939.

- 1 a historic place or building is very old
 - the restoration of historic buildings
 - ancient historic sites
 - our historic monuments
- 2 (IN A CAR) [countable] if you give someone a lift, you take them somewhere in your car SYN ride
 - Do you want a lift into town?
 - John gave me a lift home.
 - **◄**) He very kindly offered me a lift.

com·pass /ˈkʌmpəs/ •○○ noun 🗐 🗐

- 1 [countable] an instrument that shows directions and has a needle that always points north
 - a map and compass

compass points/points of the compass (=the marks on a compass that

show you north, south, east, west etc)

- 1 a large mass of land surrounded by sea
 - (1) the continents of Asia and Africa

- 1 [countable] the length, height etc of something waist/chest/leg etc measurement
 - What's your waist measurement?

take/make measurements (=measure something)

■ Take measurements of the room before you buy any new furniture.

 - She started a craze for this type of jewellery.
 - At that time, scooters were the **latest craze**.

the equator

an <u>imaginary</u> line drawn around the middle of the <u>Earth</u> that is exactly the same <u>distance</u> from the North Pole and the South Pole

on/at/near the equator

■) a small village near the equator

cer·tain·ly /ˈsɜːtnli \$ ˈsɜːr-/ ●●● S1 W1 adverb [sentence adverb] ■ ●

- 1 without any doubt SYN definitely
 - I certainly never expected to become a writer.
 - They're certainly not mine.

certainly used when saying that you are sure about something

Amy's certainly growing, but she's not gaining weight.

It's certainly not the cheapest way of getting to New York.

'Is this his signature?' 'Almost certainly.'

con·ve·ni·ent /kənˈviːniənt/ ●●○ S3 adjective ■》 ■》

- 1 <u>useful</u> to you because it <u>saves</u> you time, or <u>does</u> not <u>spoil</u> your <u>plans</u> or <u>cause</u> you problems OPP **inconvenient**
 - Mail-order catalogs are a convenient way to shop.
 - My secretary will call you to arrange a convenient time to meet.

convenient for

- Is three o'clock convenient for you?
- 2 close and easy to reach OPP inconvenient
 - The bus stop around the corner is probably the most convenient.

advantage a good feature that something has, which makes it better, more useful etc than other things

The great advantage of digital cameras is that there is no film to process.

- 1 [countable, uncountable] the typical weather conditions in a particular area
 - Los Angeles' warm dry climate
- 2 [countable] an area with particular weather conditions
 - These flowers will not grow in cold climates.
